When the ties of affection and authority that bound Europe's Catholics unraveled in the sixteenth century, many cultures lost time-honored customs of faith. Some customs proved to be especially difficult for the reformers to wrest away from the people, especially those celebrated in the home. This week in Sweden, a country where the Catholic Church was disestablished four hundred years ago, a Catholic martyr from Sicily is the most beloved figure. St. Lucia, Lucy, is celebrated on December 13. The long-story-short is that Lucy was a Christian whose father wanted to marry her off to a pagan fellow, and she rejected her father's authority. To make an example of her, her father had her killed. In the course of the brutal martyrdom, Lucy lost her beautiful eyes, but her vision was miraculously restored. The candles worn today by the eldest daughter of the family are tokens of the fire that refused to harm the saint. So this patroness of light and clear vision is revered on the shortest, darkest days of the Nordic winter. Before the reform of the Gregorian calendar in the sixteenth century, December 13 was the winter solstice.

Today, young girls appear in the morning wearing lighted candles on their crowned heads (battery-operated now after many mishaps), and serve sweet rolls and coffee to everyone in the house. For the Swedes, who are not churchgoers, the "Lucias" are the official heralds of the holiday season and a sign of everyone's yearning for more light in this world. Europe once abounded with customs like this; the survival of this custom in Scandinavia is a sign of God's grace, and how fertile the soil is to receive the true message of Advent.

Week 38 - I've turned upside down in my Mom's womb and I am standing on my head! My knees are pressed up against my chest and there's not much room to stretch anymore!



"The desert and the parched land will exult . . . They will bloom with abundant flowers, and rejoice with joyful song." Isaiah's prophecy today corresponds wondrous with the celebration of December 12th. We arrive this year at the 485th anniversary of the blooming of abundant roses on a wintry hilltop of Tepeyac, out of season and out of place. Father Becerra Tanco, chronicler of the Pontificical University of Mexico from the 1600's, writes of the extraordinary appearance of "rosas de castilla frescas, olorosas y con rocío" (roses of Castile, fresh and perfumed, with the dew on them).

Roses in winter? Spanish roses bloom on an Aztec hilltop when the beautiful young woman appears to the aging Juan Diego, running in fear to find help for his dying uncle. Her words to him, that she is his mother, the youthful arrival speaking to the declining elder, reveal what the fresh buds confirm. When heaven breaks into our world our decay is transformed into renewal.

When earth is hijacked by heaven our anxiety and preoccupations are ejected. Isaiah tells us what the new order is: "say to those whose hearts are frightened: Be strong, fear not!"

Where God intervenes, our mundane predictions get swept away. While we constrict our lives by our lack of imagination, collapsing our futures to the limited restrictions we impose on ourselves, God ambushes us with roses in winter, with the call of a mother we never believed we would meet.

Perhaps this could be the year, this could be the Advent, that we surrender, that we abandon our scripts and respond to the voice that is calling us, leaving the path we had blazed for ourselves and wander into life of faith, a life that trusts in the God who calls us.



The origin and meaning of the Simbang Gabi novena

Simbang Gabi traces its roots to Mexico in 1587. Traditionally, Christmas Day in the Philippines is ushered in by the nine-day dawn Masses that start on Dec. 16. Originally, it popularly came to be known as Misa Aguinaldo or also known as the Misa de Gallo (Rooster's Mass) in the traditional Spanish, and these Masses are also more popularly known in Tagalog as Simbang Gabi, or "Dawn Mass." These nine dawn Masses are also considered as a novena to the Blessed Virgin Mary by the Catholic faithful. This refers to the Roman Catholic practice of performing nine days of private or public devotion to obtain special graces. In traditional Catholic belief, completing the novena is also supposed to mean that God might grant the devotee's special wish or favor. This is the time where we mostly feel the presence of the Lord because it is the spiritual preparation for Christmas, the birth of Jesus Christ. It does not matter if one has the stamina to complete the novena or not, what really matters is what is inside the heart. The blessing does not depend on the number of Masses attended, but what is important is the disposition of the person who receives the Lord's blessing. We wish to encourage all of us - not only Filipinos but also Catholics in general - to practice Simbang Gabi, because it is a great source of spiritual nourishment to all of us as we prepare for the celebration of the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ.
