PREPARE THE WAY

Saint John the Baptist appears on the scene today as Advent enters its second week. The mysterious consumer of locusts and wild honey, John echoes the words of the prophet Isaiah as he calls for repentance in the face of the nearness of the kingdom of heaven. The rhythms of the Christian life are often confounding. Each year we meet the Baptist and hear his calls for repentance. Each year we see him pointing to the one who is coming after him, the Lord Jesus. Yet each year the words and actions of John the Baptist echo anew in our hearts, because we have fallen into old sinful traps again and again. Advent gives us the opportunity once again to turn away from our sinful ways and embrace the gospel way of life. John the Baptist invites us to prepare the way for the Lord, in whom we place our hope.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Did St. Francis of Assisi invent the Christmas crib? Not exactly, but his devotion to the Incarnation and his love for the poverty of the Christ Child certainly popularized this beloved custom. Long before Francis, it was a custom at the Basilica of St. Mary Major in Rome to enshrine a rich image of Mary, gilded and bejewelled, embracing the child Jesus. This church was founded as a kind of home for the feast of Christmas in the fourth century. In 1223, Francis was ready to celebrate this feast in a new way. In the tiny city of Greccio, he asked friends to prepare a place where they could experience the poverty and suffering embraced by Christ in his birth. It was a living scene: an ox from the barn, an ass from the stable, and peasants standing in for shepherds and kings. The night of the celebration was beautiful, the weather was warm, and people came in crowds, bearing candles and singing hymns that echoed through the forest. Francis himself chanted the Gospel and preached. The custom spread quickly, and by the sixteenth century cribs were seasonal features not only in church, but in the home.

On December 17, the liturgy begins to unfold the Lord's birth before us, and it's the right time to follow this beautiful tradition. In Germany, each night throughout Advent children prepare a bedding for the manger. At bedtime prayer, a child places a single straw in the manger for each act of devotion or virtue performed during the day. If the children are good, then the Christ child will have plenty of soft bedding when he is placed in the manger on Christmas.

"Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance." John the Baptist doesn't leave us any wiggle room today as he clarifies what it means to be in or out. When left to our own devices, we come up with a myriad of ways to project attention outward; in asking what's wrong with the world, we find a way to blame everyone but ourselves.

John the Baptist returns the criterion directly to ourselves. Don't worry what everyone else is doing: what fruit are you producing?

This Advent Gospel points us to what the Christian life results in. We don't become Christians simply to feel better; we don't become disciples of Jesus solely to be consoled ourselves. To become followers of Jesus is to become ambassadors to change the world, a change that begins with a change in ourselves.

How profound a change are you ready for? Isaiah in our first reading describes a total revision of all that we know: "Then the wolf shall be a guest of the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; the calf and the voung lion shall browse together, with a little child to guide them." If the Holy Spirit were to enter your life, are you ready for a total upheaval of how you see yourself, with old habits being jettisoned, and new neighbors being welcomed?

Our readings identify preparing for Jesus as primarily being a changing of our own selves. If you decide to be a part of this welcome, open your life to profound change. Not to decide, is to decide to drift away, and merely to be a spectator as God sweeps up his children in the new kingdom of heaven.

(Short Legend history...)

The origin and meaning of the Simbang Gabi novena

Simbang Gabi traces its roots to Mexico in 1587. Traditionally, Christmas Day in the Philippines is ushered in by the nine-day dawn Masses that start on Dec. 16. Originally, it popularly came to be known as Misa Aguinaldo or also known as the Misa de Gallo (Rooster's Mass) in the traditional Spanish, and these Masses are also more popularly known in Tagalog as Simbang Gabi, or "Dawn Mass." These nine dawn Masses are also considered as a novena to the Blessed Virgin Mary by the Catholic faithful. This refers to the Roman Catholic practice of performing nine days of private or public devotion to obtain special graces. In traditional Catholic belief, completing the novena is also supposed to mean that God might grant the devotee's special wish or favor. This is the time where we mostly feel the presence of the Lord because it is the spiritual preparation for Christmas, the birth of Jesus Christ. It does not matter if one has the stamina to complete the novena or not, what really matters is what is inside the heart. The blessing does not depend on the number of Masses attended, but what is important is the disposition of the person who receives the Lord's blessing. We wish to encourage all of us – not only Filipinos but also Catholics in general - to practice Simbang Gabi, because it is a great source of spiritual nourishment to all of us as we prepare for the celebration of the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. This is open to all. Invite your families and friends!

REITERATES CHURCH TEACHING

Vatican instruction: Cremated bodies may not be scattered

CATHOLIC NEWS AGENCY, OCT. 25 -- The Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith released an instruction Oct. 25 regarding burial and cremation, reiterating the church's teaching that cremation, while strongly discouraged, can be permissible under certain restrictions -- and that scattering the ashes is forbidden.

Ad resurgendum cum Christo, or "To rise with Christ," states taht while cremation "is not prohibited" the Catholic church "continues to prefer the practice of burying the bodies of the deceased, because this shows a great esteem towards the deceased."

The document explains that after "legitimate motives" for cremation have been ascertained, the "ashes of the faithful must be laid to rest in a sacred place," such as in a cemetery or church. It goes on to state that it is not pemitted to keep the ashes in a home or to scatter them "in the air, on land, at sea or in some other way, nor may they be preserved in mementos, pieces of jewelry or other objects."

"The burial, the last liturgy for us, is an expression of our hope for the resurrection, wrote Cardinal Gerhard Muller, prefect of the congregation, "and therefore the church continues to teach that the normal burial of the body is the normal form."

As the document explains, "by burying the bodies of the faithful, the church confirms her faith in the resurrection of the body, and intends to show the great dignity of the human body as an integral part of the human person whose body forms part of their identity."
